George was born April 8, 1919, in Worthington, Minnesota, the son of Earl and Eva Brush. When the family moved to Marshalltown in 1932, he entered the public school system and was active in sports, music and dramatics. After graduation from high school in 1937, George Brush attended Marshalltown Junior College and later graduated in mechanical engineering from Iowa State University in 1943. He served as a field artillery captain during World War II for four years. After his discharge, he joined the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company in Akron, Ohio; Los Angeles, California, Detroit, Michigan, and Rome, Italy and was Director of Tire Engineering for the company. President of his high school class, college fraternity, and professional and social groups, George Brush has headed homeowner's associations, served as moderator for his church, and has participated in reenactments of historical events. He established and operated his own consulting firm in Breckenridge, Colorado, until his retirement. George and his wife Shari are parents of a son, Perry who lives in Scottsdale, Arizona with his wife Kim. They are retired in Scottsdale and often return to Marshalltown for family reunions. George is also survived by his sister Naomi McCray of San Leandro, California. In tribute to his Marshall County ancestors, he owns and maintains the family plot at Timber Creek Cemetery and erected the Miles Brush Memorial monument there honoring his Great-Grandfather, a veteran of the Civil War Union Army. George was preceded in death by his brother Robert F. Brush, his father Earl F. Brush of 2005, mother Eva F. Brush in 1981.
