## Buford family to have party, not wake

Born John Philip Buford March 14, 1934, he grew up in Illinois and developed a passion for big-band music early in life. His first job was as a drummer in a dance band. He didn't stop drumming until 1991, when he was partially disabled by a stroke.

Still, his love of music remained. In remembrance of that, his family intends to play CDs of big-band performances throughout Saturday's party.

Writing and politics closely followed drumming and big-band music on Buford's list of interests. After his stroke, he combined his skill at writing and his fascination with politics to become The Beacon's premier editorial

### John Philip 'Phil' Buford, 69, *Beacon* columnist, dies Nov. 16

DELAND — John Philip "Phil" Buford, 69, of North Boston Avenue, passed away at his home on Sunday, Nov. 16, 2003, at 5:53 a.m., following a brief yet fierce battle.

Mr. Buford was born March 14, 1934, in Carbondale, Ill., the son of J.L. and Dorothy (Draper) Buford. He graduated from Mount Vernon (III.) High School in 1952.

Following high school, he served in the U.S. Navy. After his tour of duty, Mr. Buford attended the University of Illinois, where his professors declared him a new voice in engineering.

The most important day in Mr. Buford's life was undoubtedly May 23, 1953, when he married his sweetheart for life: Nona M. Henderson.

Mr. Buford's first professional experience was playing the drums as a youngster. He continued this musical career on both a professional and amateur basis until he was partially disabled by a stroke in 1991.

His diverse professional career also included work in management, marketing, engineering, sales, research and development, consulting, and as an oil-well cementer. He was associated with Halliburton Corp., Vaculift Corp., Whiting Corp., Eriez Magnetics, American Electric Fusion Corp., Southeastern Engineering and Elmco Industries. He also served as a technical writer and computergraphics engineer for Brunswick Defense.

Mr. Buford also holds numerous patents on products and technology that range from a hybrid-engine pollutant-free concept car, the Recon Silver Saver and Convert-a-Grill for the food-service industry, to MRI technology currently in use around the world. In 1990, Mr. Buford was

named to the premier edition of Who's Who in American Inventors.

Following his stroke, Mr. Buford turned to freelance writing on a full-time basis. He wrote a weekly column for The DeLand-Deltona Beacon, and recently

completed his first novel.

Mr. Buford was a member of First United Methodist Church of DeLand. Throughout his life, he was active in various civic and service organizations, including Elks, Masons, Jaycees and PTO. He inherited an avid interest in and awareness of local, state and national politics.

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He is also survived by his mother-in-law, two sisters-in-law, and a brother-in-law, in addition to numerous cousins, nieces and nephews.

In accordance with his wishes, Mr. Buford's family will host a celebration of his life on Saturday, Nov. 22, from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. at his home, 513 N. Boston Ave. in DeLand. Parking is limited at the house; the family asks that those attending park at Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church, 509 E. Pennsylvania Ave., where a shuttle bus will be available for transportation to the Buford home.

An additional celebration will be held in Phil's hometown of Mount Vernon, at a later date.
