Henry Bullock died Saturday near Collins Resident of community many years dies at home of daughter March 10, 1932 State Center Enterprise

Henry Bullock, a pioneer resident of this community, died at 3 o'clock Saturday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Sadie Wilkening, near Collins, of cerebral hemorrhage. He had been in failing health for about a year.

Mr. Bullock claimed the distinction of being a resident of this community longer than any other living citizen. He was born May 7, 1854, in LaSalle county, Illinois and the family moved to this county in October, 1855, settling on a farm near Rhodes, where they lived until April 18, 1866, when they moved to State Center. His father, Rutson (sic) Bullock, operated the first hotel in State Center.

On February 21, 1882, Henry Bullock was married to Mary Agnes Dolan of Colo, at State Center. They lived in Wyoming for two years and returned to State Center in 1884. Mr. Bullock remained a resident of this city until the death of his wife, which occurred Jan. 12, 1931. Since then he has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Wilkening.

Four children survive Mr. Bullock. In addition to Mrs. Wilkening they are Mrs. Albert Hart, of this city, Mrs. John Swinbank of Collins and Thomas Bullock of near Colo. He is also survived by ten grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

The funeral services were held at 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning from St. Joseph's Catholic church at State Center. The services were in charge of Rev. J.J. Buzynski of this city and Rev. F.J. Frien of St. Anthony. The pallbearers were Hugh Kielly, Pat Pekin, J.L. McMahon, M.E. Hilleman, and C.R. Linn of State Center and Will Sinnot of Collins. The flowers were cared for by Mrs. C.R.
