

Funeral Services Held at Collins for Ellsworth Campbell 1944

Collins, Jan. 28—Funeral services for the late Ellsworth Campbell of Collins, who passed away Saturday forenoon, at his farm home south of town, were held at the local Church of Christ, Monday at 2:00 p.m., with the Rev. Lloyd Patton of Center Point, a former pastor, in charge of the services. A ladies' quartet composed of Mrs. K. W. Tomlinson, Mrs. L. M. Hall, Mrs. L. D. Holland and Mrs. O. H. Gearhart with Mrs. Hugh Fertig at the piano sang two songs, "The Lord Is My Shephard," and "The Eastern Gate," favorite songs of the deceased. The flowers were arranged at the church and grave by Mrs. Lloyd Cummings and Mrs. O. N. Serbein. Interment was in Evergreen cemetery at Collins in the family lot.

Fervent lodge No. 513 A. F. and A. M. of Collins had charge of the grave side service, with Art Christy of Maxwell giving the very impressive and comforting ritualistic service.

The pallbearers were chosen from the local Masonic lodge and were Warren Kitchell, Chas. Carr, H. C. Westcott, Steve Inman, Mil-lard Ward, and K. W. Tomlinson. Other members attended in a body to do honor to the memory of the brother who was the first candidate initiated into the local lodge and whose membership was continuous for more than 53 years.

Ellsworth Campbell, Son of Ira

A. and Emily Campbell, was born near Clyde in Clear Creek town-ship, Jasper county, Iowa, on Dec. 30, 1864 and passed away on the old home farm south of Col-lins, Jan. 22, 1944, at the age of 79 years, 1 months and 2 days.

The greater part of his life was spent in Collins where he owned and operated a harness business, for over thirty years, later being interested in farming.

He was the first candidate initiated into Fervent Lodge No. 513 A. F. and A. M., with a continuous membership of more than fifty-three years, he was also a charter member of the Order of the East-ern Star.

Surviving the deceased are two brothers, Curt and Frank Camp-bell of Collins, one niece, Mrs. Zela Hubbard of Collins, three nephews, Lloyd Campbell of Des Moines, Ralph and Ira Campbell of Collins, several cousins and a host of friends and neighbors.

In the passing of Ellsworth Campbell, Collins lost another of its pioneer business men. He came into the town when but a boy to learn the harness trade and later became owner of the business. He earned a reputation for honesty and fair dealing and made many friends. He will be truly mourned in this community.

Ellsworth Campbell, Collins Pioneer, Laid to Rest Today 1944

Collins, Jan. 24—Funeral serv-ices were held at the Church of Christ in Collins this afternoon at 2:00 for Ellsworth Campbell, 79, native son of the Collins neigh-borhood, who had spent his entire lifetime in the community.

He was born on a farm south of Collins in Jasper county, Decem-ber 20, 1864, a son of Ira and Emily Campbell, and death took place at the home of his brother, Curt Campbell, southeast of Col-lins, shortly after noon Saturday.

Born near Clyde in Jasper county, he came to Collins as a young man and was engaged in the harness business for a time

but later joined his brother on the farm.

He was never married, leaving only his brothers Curt and Frank Campbell, as well as three neph-ews. He was a man held in very high regard in the community in which he had spent his entire life-time and the funeral rites, in charge of Rev. Lloyd Patton, were largely attended.

Burial, in the Collins cemetery, was in charge of the Collins Ma-sonic Lodge, of which organization Mr. Campbell was the first candi-date to be received and had con-tinued to be an active Mason.

Ellsworth Campbell, 79, native son of the Collins neighborhood, died at the home of his brother, Curt Campbell southeast of Collins, shortly after noon Saturday.

Funeral services were held at the Church of Christ in Collins Monday afternoon in charge of Rev. Lloyd Patton. Burial, in the Collins ceme-tery, was in charge of the Collins Masonic lodge, of which Mr. Camp-bell was the first candidate to be re-ceived, and had continued to be an active Mason. 1-27-1944

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
