Samuel Carver died at his home in Webster City Sunday December 15, 1918 from a blood clot on the brain. He was in apparent good health and was leading a cow to the barn when it became unmanagable and he was thrown to the ground and death followed soon after. Deceased was born in Pennsylvania May 7, 1853 and lived near Collins on the farm now occupied by Thos. Duesbury and known as the Morrison farm. He was 65 years, 7 months and 8 days old at the time of his death and leaves to mourn his loss his loving wife and one son Wayne besides four brothers Ed and Ben of Collins Ira of Lamore, South Dakota, John of Grand Forks, North Dakota, and three sisters Mrs. R. H. Teeters of Marshalltown, Mrs. John Hughes of Webster City and Mrs. Joe Dickson of Collins besides many other relatives and a host of friends. Samuel Carver was a good citizen, a kind neighbor and was loved by all who knew him. Funeral services were held at Webster City Tuesday. The body was brot to Collins for burial and all his brothers and sisters were present except John who was unable to attend. He was laid At Rest in the Evergreen cemetery Wednesday afternoon. Short services were conducted at the cemetery by Rev. F. W. Ingvoldstad.

The following is the obituary of the late Samuel Carver taken from The Daily Freeman Journal of Webster City.

Samuel Carver was born in Wyoming county, Pennsylvania May 7, 1853. He resided there with his parents until they moved to southern Wisconsin some few years later. They also lived in Illinois a short time before coming to Iowa. About the year 1875 the family came to Iowa and finally settled in Jasper county. His mother and father died some years ago. Mr. Carver and family came to Webster City about six years ago.

Mr. Carver was married to Miss Eva Lowe at Delavan, Minnesota in 1902, to this union was born one son, Wayne who is now 15 years old. He is survived by his wife and son, seven sisters and four brothers, Mrs. Lydia Stark and Miss Florence Carver of Long Beach, California, Mrs. B. F. Garrett of Aurora, Nebraska, Mrs. R. H. Teeter of Marshalltown, Iowa, Mrs. Wm. Stark of Maxwell, Mrs. Joe Dickson, Edward and Ben Carver of Collins, Iowa, John Carver of Mallory, Minnesota, Ira Carver of Lamour North Dakota, and Mrs. J. B. Hughes of this city.

Mr. Carver was a man of the highest type. He was a faithful member of the Methodist church and it can be well said that he numbered his friends with his acquaintances. The body was taken to Collins, Iowa for burial.
