

Eatwell, George S. d. 6-13-1918

Obituary of Geo S. Eatwell

George Stephen Eatwell was born on the old Eatwell home place, in Jasper County Iowa, two miles east of Farrar, December 6, 1869 and died suddenly of heart failure at his home in Jasper County June 13 1918, being 48 years, 6 months and 7 days old. He grew up, upon the farm, learning the business of a practical farmer, and liked and respected by all who knew him. He was married to Margaret Rowena Longnecker, November 19, 1893. To this union six children were born, all living, Mrs. Simpson Huntrod of Maxwell, Iowa, and Treva, Laura, Orlando, Eldon and Mary, all of whom are still at home to be a comfort, help and blessing to the bereaved mother. Also there are remaining to mourn his

hasty departure, his aged mother, three brothers, Cyrus J. of Mingo, Albert C. of Zearing, Iowa and James M. of Scotts Bluff, Neb., also three sisters, Mrs. Julia Long, Mrs. James Dunlap, and Mrs. Mary Dorsey, all of Farrar, Iowa. There are three grand children and a very large number of other near relatives, with a whole neighborhood of friends, who live to attest his worth as a citizen. His father, and one sister went on before. Mr. Eatwell was converted and joined the Farrar Methodist Protestant church in 1903, since which he has lived a consistent, faithful Christian life, often expressing his faith and confidence to his pastor in the eternal promises of God whereon we do not suffer as those that have no hope, but our hope is in God, believing that they that are dead, that believed in Him, shall live again. The funeral service was held in the Farrar church, of which he was a member, conducted by Rev. McCain. The burial was in the Farrar Cemetery. An immense throng attended the services and thus attest to the value of the life removed.

His aged mother, three brothers and three sisters, with three grandchildren and a very large number of near relatives, also a host of friends are left to lament his hasty departure. The brothers and sisters are: Cyrus J., of Mingo, Iowa; Albert C., of Zearing, Iowa; James M., of Scotts-bluff, Neb.; Mrs. Chas. Long, Mrs. James Dunlap and Mrs. Mary Dorsey, of Farrar, Iowa. His father and one sister had preceded him in death.
