

Dodd, Dollie Evans d. 3-29-1941

**MRS. DOLLIE DODD
PASSED AWAY
SATURDAY NIGHT**

Friends were saddened to learn of the death of Mrs. Dollie Dodd, widow of the late Milo Dodd, which occurred at about 10:30 Saturday night at the Deaconess hospital in Marshalltown. She had been ill for several months, and had been a hospital patient for about five weeks, having undergone a major operation shortly after entering the hospital.

Funeral services were held from the Collins Church of Christ Tuesday afternoon, April 1, at 2:00 o'clock, with the Rev. Carl Crouse of Rhodes in charge. A quartet, composed of Mrs. K. W. Tomlinson, Mrs. George Holmes, J. R. Witmer and Ned Stuntz, sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere", "There'll Be No Tears in Paradise" and "Going Down the Valley." They were accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Hugh Fertig. Mrs. Floyd Bates and Mrs. Roy Ridgeway were flower attendants. The pallbearers were C. G. Vasey, W. A. Kitchel, Dennis Halterman, H. C. Westcott, Carl Day and H. W. Johnson. Interment was made in Collins Evergreen cemetery.

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Dollie Evans, daughter of Charles and Orcelia Evans, was born at Walnut, Ill., December 13, 1875, and passed away at Marshalltown, Iowa, March 29, 1941, at the age of 65 years, 3 months and 16 days.

She had spent all of her life in the Collins community, except for a few years in South Dakota and northern Iowa.

She was united in marriage to Milo Dodd of Collins July 19, 1894, at Nevada. To this union were born five children: Clem of Des Moines, Mrs. Lelah Ebaugh of Clear Lake, Mrs. Ila Scharringhausen and Mrs. Vilda McIlvane of Omaha, Neb., and Charles of Collins, all of whom survive her. She also leaves 15 grandchildren and two great grandchildren. A sister, Mrs. Jennie Stephens, and a brother, Leonard Evans, also survive her. Her husband passed away in 1934. Two sisters, Minnie and Lucy Ellen, preceded her in death.

She was a loving mother and sister, and a faithful friend. In her passing the children have lost a mother who cared for them in their infancy and childhood, a mother whose love and sympathy they have had through life. And the sweetest memory they can cherish is her memory—the memory of Mother.
