## Gardner, William 5. d. 12-26-1940

William Sylvester Gardner, son of David and Betsy Ann Gardner, was born near Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 18, 1851, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charley Swalwell, near Maxwell, Ia., Dec. 26, 1940, at the age of 89 years, 3 months and 9 days.

He came with his parents from Indiana in 1863 and settled in northwest Jasper county. On May 28, 1874, he was united in marriage to Elizabeth Anne Tomlinson. To this union eight children were born of whom two daughters and three sons survive. Two boys and one girl died in childhood. Mrs. Gardner died 16 years ago, being buried on New Year's day.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. May Maxwell of Amboy, Minn.: Mrs. Eva Swalwell of Maxwell, and three sons, Stephen of Cogswell, N. D.: John of San Haven, N. D., and Everett of Maxwell. Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Wm.
