

HALL, Frank

d. 6-24-1919

Little Frank Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Hall, who live about six miles south of Collins was fatally burned last Tuesday, when he and the other children found matches and were playing with them near a can of gasoline. The can exploded catching the little fellows clothing on fire which burned him, causing death about two hours later.

The funeral is to be held this afternoon at Ashton at 2:30. The parents have the heartfelt sympathy of all.

Franklin Edward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde D. Hall was born near Farrar July 5, 1917 and departed this life at the home near Mingo on June 24th 1919 at the tender age of one year, eleven months and nineteen days.

He had been in fine health and spirits when the tragic accident that ended his life and brought such sadness to his parents and friends occurred he with his little sister Bertha had been playing in the wash house and had been out of the sight of the mother only a few minutes. Little Franklin had been playing with the gasoline can watching the pump shoot the liquid out in a stream and getting some of it on his clothing when his sister who was planning to make a fire in the yard struck a match close

by. The mother heard the little fellows screams and rushed to him as he came out of the wash house all in flames. The blaze was extinguished as soon as possible and all that was possible was done to save his little life but to no avail. He only lived a little while suffering intensely.

He leaves to mourn his loss his father and mother, one sister Bertha aged 5 and one brother Cecil aged 9 years, one brother having preceded him in death several years ago. He is also survived by four grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Edd Shuey of Mingo and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hall of Redfield, South Dakota and two aunts Mrs. Thomas Mather of Redfield, South Dakota and Mrs. Carl Altes of Kellogg, two uncles, Harvey Shuey of Mingo and Willis Hall who is still

over in France, and two great-grandmothers, Mrs. Mary Shuey of Mingo and Mrs. James Hall of Maxwell besides his other relatives and friends whom he has won by his happy and cheerful little life.

Funeral services were held at Ashton Thursday afternoon conducted by Rev. Arthur Adams of Mingo and interment made in the Ashton cemetery where he was laid by the side of his infant brother
