Former Nevadan is dead at 71, rites Tuesday

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 for former Nevadan Charles Raymond Henson, 71, who died Sunday morning at the University Hospital in Iowa City.

He had been ill for the past three months.

A retired farmer who had lived at Melbourne the past 20 years, Mr. Henson had been a resident of the Nevada community for the 40 years prior.
