Franklin James Kimberley was born in Allamakee county; Jowa. December 21, 1863, and departed this life Nowember 2, 1852, at the age of 68 years, 10 months and 12 days. Although he had been in failing health for the last two years, his passing at this time was not expected until shortly before the end.

Frank, as he was commonly known to everyone, was the som of Isalah and Mary (Cleverley) Kimberley, both years ago. Harly in life he came with his parents to Jasper county and resided there until he moved to the present home in Collins.

Of the fifteen children in the Klimberdey family of which Frank was a member, but three now remain: Harrien Swalwell and Charlie Klimberdey, both of Collins, and Ruth Pearson of Maxwell, Iowa. The brothers, John B., William, George, Arthur, Furton, Lewis and Stephen, and the sisters, Ada Angelo, Louisa, Bertha and Ellen, have passed beyond.

On March 4, 1894, he was unified in marriage to Nettle Bence. To them were born two sons, LeRny Francis, who died in infancy, and Charles, who now resides on the old home place with his wife and children, Jean, George and Richard.
