

Final Rites Saturday For William Morrison

Funeral services for the late William Morrison were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Collins Church of Christ, in charge of the Rev. Will Stevens of Washington, Iowa.

Obituary

William Morrison, son of Thomas Jefferson and Anna Morrison, was born on the Morrison homestead southwest of Collins in Jasper county, Oct. 3, 1872, and departed this life at his home in Collins Wednesday, Sept. 13, 1950, about 10:00 p. m., at the age of 77 years, 11 months and 10 days.

He grew to manhood on the farm where he was born and which he later owned.

On September 15, 1896, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Link of Maxwell. The following New Year's day they laid the foundation for a new house on the farm where 50 years later they celebrated their Golden Wedding.

To this union two sons were born, Clarence L. and Glen W.

After a severe illness following an accident about six years ago, Mr. Morrison found it advisable to leave the farm, so in March, 1947 they moved to the present home in Collins. 9-23-1950
