Floyd W. Phares, 83, of Marshalltown and formerly of Ames, died Sunday of a heart ailment at Madrid Home in Madrid. Services will be at 1 p.m. Thursday at Bacon Funeral Home in Maxwell. Burial will be in Collins Evergreen Cemetery with full military honors.

Floyd W. Phares was born Feb. 7, 1919, in rural Collins, the son of Benjamin and Iva (Brown) Phares. He graduated from Newton High School in 1939. He attended Barber College. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He received a Purple Heart and other service medals. He married Mabel Dimple Byers DeHoet Feb. 7, 1947.

He owned a barber shop in Ames for several years. He was a lifetime member of the Disabled Veterans of America.

He was a lifetime member of the Disabled Veterans of America.
