She was the last of her family. Her father died many years ago; a sister Emma, passed away when about 14 years of age; another sister. Mrs. Mary Louise Hemping, departed this life about five years ago and her mother answered the final summons almost two years ago.

She leaves to mourn her loss, her husband and two sons, two grand-children, other more distant relatives and a host of friends.
