**Obituary: Sherman Ulum**

Sherman Ulum was born in Linn county, Oct. 14, 1867, and died at his home in Maxwell, Ia., July 26, 1933, at the age of 65 years, 9 months and 12 days. He moved with his parents to Story county as a small lad. He has resided here ever since. For many years he lived on a farm north of Maxwell. Sixteen years ago he moved to Maxwell and went into business.

On Feb. 18, 1891, he was united in marriage to Eliza Thornton of Colo, Ia. To this union one child was born, who died in infancy. Those of his immediate family who survive him are his wife, one step-brother, Ernie Allard of Des Moines; his step-mother, Mrs. Wm. Ulum. He will also be greatly missed by relatives and many friends to whom he endeared himself.

Sherman was a man of sincerity of purpose, quiet in disposition, deeply devoted to his wife. He enjoyed the highest respect and good wishes of his fellow countrymen who knew him. A number of years ago he and Mrs Ulum made a home for Floyd Bullock, then without a home. A few years ago Eileen Bullock, Floyd's daughter, came to make their home with Mr. and Mrs. Ulum. They enjoyed extending their hand of sympathy and helpfulness to others.

## DEATH OF SHERMAN ULUM

Sherman Ulum, 63, long time resident of the Maxwell community, died at his home Wednesday, July 26, at 9 p. m., after an illness dating since April 16, when he suffered a stroke of paralysis.

The funeral services were held at the M. E. church at Maxwell, Friday afternoon, with the Rev. W. M. Scheuermann in charge. Interment was in the Colo cemetery.

Mr. Ulum was a native of Linn county, his parents being Mr. and Mrs. William Ulum. When a boy he came with the family to Story county and the home was established in the Dalton neighborhood.

Sixteen years ago he moved into Maxwell and engaged in the garage business, continuing in that as long as his health permitted.

He leaves besides his wife, a step-mother, Mrs. William Ulum, and a stepbrother, Ernest Allard, both of Des Moines.

Mr. Ulum had a wide acquaintance in the county as well as over central Iowa and his death is mourned by a large circle of friends.
